

Open letter to Australia's major banks concerning climate change action

On behalf of the undersigned groups and individuals:

Dear Mr Elliott, Mr Narev, Mr Thorburn and Mr Hartzer,

We represent approximately 850,000 Australians, the vast majority of whom are customers of your banks. We are writing to call on you to urgently follow through on the commitments and support offered last year to help hold global warming to below two degrees.

As you acknowledged late last year, the financial sector has an important role to play in holding global warming to below two degrees. However, we are concerned that you are not fulfilling this role, having failed to deliver policy and practical responses in line with the goal.

This letter outlines what we consider a <u>minimum level of action</u> that would demonstrate you are serious about your intentions to support the two degree global warming limit. Specifically, you must avoid:

- new credit facilities that would enable new fossil fuel projects, or the expansion of existing projects' footprints or lifetimes;
- new corporate credit facilities to companies actively seeking to expand the fossil fuel industry;
- participating in bonds that contain credit exposure to companies seeking to expand the fossil fuel industry and/or new fossil fuel projects; and
- advisory mandates for new fossil fuel projects.

Additionally, you must demonstrate, through policy and practice, an intent to;

- permanently reduce to zero credit exposure to the thermal coal sector by 2020; and
- permanently reduce to zero credit and asset management exposure to the remainder of the fossil fuel sector by 2030.

While reducing your exposure to the fossil fuel sector, we also expect that you will scale up your renewable energy lending, issuing at least \$20 billion in renewable energy projects by 2020.

Finally, we expect that you will use your power and influence by participating in the public debate on climate change in your own name, putting on record the need for government policies and action from industry that aligns the economy with limiting global warming to below two degrees.

It is on these actions that we will continue to judge and assess your credibility on climate change and we will have no hesitation in reporting to your customers and the wider public any failure to meet these minimum standards of action. You play too important a role and this is too important an issue for us to allow for anything less.
